Just then the disciples came. They were astonished that he was speaking with a woman, but no one said, "What do you want?" or, "Why are you speaking with her?" Then the woman left her water jar and went back to the city. She said to the people, "Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done! He cannot be the Messiah, can he?" They left the city and were on their way to him. Meanwhile the disciples were urging him, "Rabbi, eat something." But Jesus said to them, "I have food to eat that you do not know about." So the disciples said to one another, "Surely no one has brought him something to eat?" Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of God who sent me and to complete God's work. Do you not say, 'Four months more, then comes the harvest'? But I tell you, look around you, and see how the fields are ripe for harvesting. The reaper is already receiving wages and is gathering fruit for eternal life, so that sower and reaper may rejoice together. For here the saying holds true, 'One sows and another reaps.' I sent you to reap that for which you did not labour. Others have laboured, and you have entered into their labour." Many Samaritans from the city believed in Jesus because of the woman's testimony." He told me everything I have ever done." So when the Samaritans came to Jesus, they asked him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman, "It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Saviour of the world."

Sermon: Now I See!

Sun Mar 19

The final sentence of 1 Samuel 15 is "And God was sorry to have made Saul king over Israel." It may come as a surprise that the Old Testament portrays God as fallible, as expressing regret over something as important as having made a wrong choice in a matter as consequential as who was made king. What matters is that God doesn't stop trying and in doing so makes a surprising choice for the next king. Both this week's Psalm and story about Jesus remind us that God works in very personal and direct ways that profoundly challenge everything we think we know. When have you experienced a situation that in retrospect could only have been God at work? How did this affect your relationship with God and with other people?

GREEN BITES

Human life, and the life of everything on Mother Earth, depends on water. Unfortunately, many of our rivers such as the Ganges, Amazon, Rhine, and the Nile, not to mention many of the rivers in here in North America, are full of toxic chemicals, plastic, sewage, and trash. In fact, the rivers are dying. Where will we get water, especially clean water, in the future? But there is hope. The UN Water Conference will take place on March 22 to 24 in New York. Let us hope that world leaders will implement a plan to preserve and protect earth's water, and not simply agree to do so. After all, water experts throughout the world warn us that within two years, about two-thirds of the world's population could face shortages of clean water. And if you have a prayer list, consider adding the UN Water Conference to that list. - The Environmental Stewardship Group.

EMAIL SAFETY TIPS

Recently people from the church have been experiencing scam emails, using a method called spoofing. Email spoofing is when a scammer forges (spoofs) the email's from address, so the sent message appears to have been sent from someone you know with the intention of infecting your computer with malware, asking for money or stealing information. These addresses can either be created by using alternative numbers or letters to look slightly different than the original, or by disguising the 'from' field to be the exact email address of someone in your network. If you receive an email that looks like it is from someone you know, requesting gift cards or help and asking for secrecy, please feel free to call Elyse in the church office or the person who sent it to confirm legitimacy, do not reply to the email because the reply will get sent to the scammer.

What to do if your email has been spoofed:

Don't panic, spoofing does not mean that the scammer has access to your account, they are only making it appear as though they do. You have not been hacked. Spoofing is a temporary issue that will often be resolved in a few weeks when the scammer will move on.

- 1. Email everyone in your contacts to let them know to disregard any suspicious emails from you.
- Just to be safe, run a full virus scan on your computer. This ensures that you have not experienced a malware or virus infection and helps eliminate the possibility that you have a compromised account.
- 3. Update your email password, making sure that you have a robust and secure password.
