

Worship Notes

There are at least two biblical controversies regarding donkeys, or "donkroversies" as I call them. One is the donkey depicted in pictures around the nativity, shown carrying Mary to Bethlehem. Neither the Gospel of Luke or Matthew mentions a donkey, but Mary walking all that way while very pregnant is unthinkable. The other controversy is around Jesus' mount during his entry into Jerusalem apparently on both a donkey and her colt according to Matthew's telling of the story. If true, this would be awkward to say the least! The writer of the Gospel according to Matthew was extremely eager to show direct connections with the existing scriptures. In Zechariah 9:9, which emphasizes the humility of the coming king on a donkey, writes so that the reader can't miss the point that the real coming king will be riding a humble donkey, that, "yes, you heard correctly folks--a donkey!" The writer of Matthew seems to add an "and" where it doesn't really belong hence the confusion and the odd image.
