ACCESSIBILITY

There is an elevator located inside the building with the glass door entrance.

Access ramps can be found: inside leading from the lobby to the sanctuary and outside at the rear of the building, leading from the parking lot.

There are accessible washrooms located in the lobby near the elevator.

Hearing assistance devices are available from the ushers.

Large print worship bulletins, and hymn books are available from the ushers.

Service animals are welcome, except where food is prepared.

We commit to make R-W a comfortable space for people with cognitive impairment. If you require accommodations related to cognitive functioning please contact the office.

BABY/ CHILDREN'S AMENITIES

People can breastfeed anywhere in the building, should you want more privacy there is designated nursing space in the Millson room, located by the grand piano. Baby changing tables are installed in all washrooms. If you wish to use it, a children's activity centre is set up in the Chapel. There are also activity books available for children. Please ask the usher.

God's Holy Word

Aria: He Was Despised, by G. F. Handel Melisa Guilbeault, soloist

Scripture:

John 19:38-42 • The burial of Jesus.

After these things, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, though a secret one because of his fear of the Jews, asked Pilate to let him take away the body of Jesus. Pilate gave him permission; so he came and removed his body. Nicodemus, who had at first come to Jesus by night, also came, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, weighing about a hundred pounds. They took the body of Jesus and wrapped it with the spices in linen cloths according to the burial custom of the Jews. Now there was a garden in the place where he was crucified, and in the garden there was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. And so, because it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.

Voices United 950 Hymn: Stay with Me

Stay with me, remain here with me, watch and pray, watch and pray. (X3)

Praver:

A kind-hearted child is laid to rest and a loving mother bids him farewell. She walks away with mystery in her heart and a thousand tears in her grieving soul.

(Pause to reflect on Mary's grief as Jesus is laid in the tomb.)

Mary, you have been there before us.

You have stood at the tomb of farewell.

We, too, often face painful endings.

Like you, we need to eventually let go,

believing that the Holy One will console us.

You know how grief engulfs the heart and tries to strangle the hope it contains.

You have felt the drain of a great loss and the emptiness it creates inside. Teach us how to have confidence in God when we question what the future holds.

Strengthen our faith as we try to let go of whatever keeps us from growing deeper.

We remember those who are moving through painful farewells...

(Pause for silent remembering)

Mary, teach us how to be people of faith.

Amen.³

Voices United 950

Hymn: Stay with Me Stay with me, remain here with me,

watch and pray, watch and pray. (X3)

Scripture:

Romans 6:3-11 • Dying and Rising with Christ.

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Creator, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Psalm 31:1-4, 15-16 • Prayer and Praise for Deliverance.

It is the acceptance of life in the midst of death, not because we have courage, or light, or wisdom to accept, but because by some miracle the God of life accepts to live, in us, at the very moment when we descend into death.

HOLY WEEK AND EASTER

This week (Holy week) we have honoured Jesus' life and death through a variety of hour long worshipful experiences.



In the last week of Jesus' life, he entered Jerusalem with people cheering him on with a **Palm Parade**. (Palm Sunday)



A few days later he had dinner with this friends - his disciples - and he gave them communion at the **Last Supper**. (Maundy Thursday) After dinner he went to the garden to pray. While in the garden Jesus got arrested!

On Friday (Good Friday) there was a trial and Jesus was sentenced, tortured and crucified.



The disciples and Mary, the mother of Jesus, and Mary Magdalene mourned his death and held a **Vigil** (Easter Vigil, this service)

Three days after being crucified the tomb where his body laid was empty. **Jesus was resurrected!** (Easter Sunday)
