GREEN BITES

In Canada and throughout the world, there are people working hard to preserve historic buildings. Often heard are the words "Demolition through neglect" and "The greenest building is one already built." However, there is more to preservation than meets the eye. Several organizations now talk about CARE, which stands for Carbon Avoided: Retrofit Estimator. CARE is a program that helps people to make decisions regarding retrofitting existing buildings, their reuse, and whether or not a new building should be constructed. Although the City of Edmonton hasn't yet developed a CARE tool*, there is a program to provide a rebate for retrofitting commercial buildings. As well, an Energy Tool Kit is available through Edmonton Public Library which assists the householder in determining energy use. *See Caretool.org for more information. - The Environmental Stewardship Group
