

Baby changing tables are installed in all washrooms. If you wish to use it, a children's activity centre is set up in the Chapel. There are also activity books available for children. GREEN BITES

Edmonton's home gardens contain many invasive plant species. Several of them were brought by settlers, either knowingly or unknowingly, or came in the cargo from various countries. Many Edmonton gardeners don't know that some of their plant material is in fact invasive. Examples are plantain, Himalayan balsam, garlic mustard, toadflax, and dame's rocket, to name a few. Readers can become familiar with our invasive species by consulting the website abinvasives.ca.
