Ruth 1:1-17; 4:13-17 • Where you go I will go!

In the days when the judges ruled there was a famine in the land, and a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah went to live in the country of Moab, he and his wife and two sons. The name of the man was Elimelech and the name of his wife Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion; they were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah. They went into the country of Moab and remained there. But Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died, and she was left with her two sons. These took Moabite wives; the name of the one was Orpah and the name of the other Ruth. When they had lived there about ten years, both Mahlon and Chilion also died, so that the woman was left without her two sons and her husband. Then she started to return with her daughter-in-law from the country of Moab, for she had heard in the country of Moab that the Lord had considered the people and given them food. So she set out from the place where she had been living, she and her two daughters-in-law, and they went on their way to go back to the land of Judah. But Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back each of you to your mother's house. May the Lord deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me. The Lord grant that you may find security, each of you in the house of your husband." Then she kissed them, and they wept aloud. They said to her, "No, we will return with you to your people." But Naomi said, "Turn back my daughters, why will you go with me? Do I still have sons in my womb that they may become your husbands? Turn back, my daughters, go your way, for I am too old to have a husband. Even if I thought there was hope for me, even if I should have a husband tonight and bear sons, would you then wait until they were grown? Would you then refrain from marrying? No, my daughters, it has been far more bitter for me than for you, because the hand of the Lord has turned against me." Then they wept aloud again. Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her. So she said, 'See, your sister-inlaw has gone back to her people and to her gods; return after your sisterin-law." But Ruth said, "Do not press me to leave you or to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die- there will I be buried. May the Lord do thus and so to me, and more as well, if even death parts me from you!"

So Boaz took Ruth and she became his wife. When they came together, the Lord made her conceive, and she bore a son. Then the women said to Naomi, "Blessed be the Lord, who has not left you this day without nextof-kin; and may the Lord's name be renowned in Israel! The Lord shall be to your a restorer of life and a nourisher of your old age; for your

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED WHERE RWUC GETS FUNDING

Robertson-Wesley United Church (RWUC) maintains its financial stability through diverse funding sources, ensuring the support of its ministry, operations, and community outreach. With an annual donation income of \$470,000, RWUC has established a robust financial framework comprising of various revenue streams, each playing a pivotal role in sustaining the church's activities and services.

The core of RWUC's financial support comes from its devoted congregation, comprising regular churchgoers and community members who generously contribute to Robertson-Wesley's call. These donations, often offered during weekly services or through online platforms, constitute a substantial portion of the church's annual income, reflecting a sense of community and shared values among members. For 2023: Bequests, totalling \$16,000 annually, represent another

significant source of support. These funds are received through the wills and estates of individuals dedicated to leaving a lasting legacy to the church, bolstering RWUC's financial confidence for the future. Special events like funerals and weddings contribute to RWUC's income. Funerals contribute \$6,000 annually, while weddings generate \$7,000. RWUC serves as a serene and welcoming venue for these occasions, providing a fitting setting for both remembrance and celebration. Beyond religious functions, RWUC generates \$67,000 annually through facility rentals. Local organizations, businesses, and individuals frequently rent its versatile spaces, fostering financial support and strong community ties.

RWUC also actively engages in fundraising, contributing an additional \$20,000 annually. These efforts may include campaigns, charity events, and special projects designed to actively involve the congregation and the wider community. Fundraising at RWUC goes beyond finances; it embodies a collective commitment to the church's mission. In conclusion, RWUC's financial sustainability thrives on its diverse funding approach. Donations, bequests, event-related income, rental revenue, and active fundraising contribute to the church's growth and community service. This financial diversity provides a solid foundation and reflects the collaborative spirit of RWUC's vibrant church community. By leveraging these funding sources, RWUC continues to fulfill its mission of faith, service, and community engagement, enriching the lives of its members and the broader community it serves.
