

Worship Notes

Thank you to Robertson-Wesley Choir, soloists Claire Rolheiser, Jacqueline Hernandez, Raydene Koch, percussionist David Kelmer, and Beth Levia, oboe for their musical leadership this evening.

The cover image is a Nativity Icon, which reveals Orthodox Christian Theology.

Mary and Jesus: In the middle of the nativity icon are Mary the central, and disproportionately large figure, and Jesus as a baby in a manger wrapped in swaddling clothes. Swaddling clothes represent the complete submission of Christ to the physical conditions governing the human race. Further, his swaddling bands resemble grave clothes and the manger looks very much like a casket, again emphasizing Jesus' mortality.

Setting: The background is an inhospitable world, the world since the expulsion from Paradise. Nonetheless, the earth provides Jesus and Mary with a cave for safety. The animals near the Christ Child watch Him in silent wonder, providing warmth with their breath. Specifically, the ox and the ass are from an Old Testament prophecy: "The ox knows his owner, and the donkey his master" (Isaiah 1:3). A further Old Testament prophecy is represented by the "Jesse Tree" (bottom right) which states: "A shoot shall sprout from the stump (tree) of Jesse and from his roots a bud shall blossom. The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him." (Isaiah 11:1-2). Jesse is the father of the legendary King David who, according to the story told in Luke's Gospel is an ancestor of Jesus' earthly father, Joseph and the reason that Jesus was born in Bethlehem, "the City of David."

Star: The sky salutes Him with a star, the light of wisdom. It also alludes to the magi, foreigners practicing a foreign religion, who followed a star to find and worship Jesus.

Angels: The angels are shown glorifying God, ministering to Jesus and also announcing the Good News to the shepherds.

Women: The women on the bottom right are midwives. This indicates that Jesus was born in the normal way and would have needed washing, as a regular human baby would. The wash basin also resembles a baptismal font.

Joseph: The Righteous Joseph (bottom left) is depicted away from Jesus and the Mother of God. This is because he was not involved in the miracle of the Incarnation of the Son of God, but he was the protector of Mary and Jesus. The old man speaking to him represents the devil bringing new doubts to Joseph. The devil suggests that if the infant were truly divine He would not have been born in the human way with human vulnerability. In the person of Joseph, the icon discloses not only his personal drama, but the drama of all humankind, the difficulty of accepting that which is beyond reason, the Incarnation of God. Still, the halo that surrounds Joseph's head designates him as holy.
