

Mark 6:1-13 • Rejection of Jesus and the Mission of the Twelve. Jesus left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offence at him. Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honour, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." Best Picture Nominated Movie: Barbie

Continuing a Robertson-Wesley tradition, on Sunday, February 11, the sermon will look at the scripture reading of the day with an Oscar-nominated movie in mind. LEARN THE SIGNS OF A SCAM

Phone and internet scams have been making the rounds again. Many scams and frauds attempt to imitate businesses or government services in order to gain access to your personal and financial information. It may be a scam if someone is:

- Demanding immediate payment
- Requesting payment with cryptocurrency like bitcoin or gift cards
- Using threatening language
- Sending you a link to click on
- Asking for personal or financial information

How to protect yourself

- Don't be afraid to say no
- Don't be intimidated by high-pressure tactics
- Watch out for urgent pleas that play on your emotions
- Do your research
- Don't give out personal information
- Beware of unsolicited calls where the caller asks you for personal information, such as: Your name, Your address, Your birthdate, Your Social Insurance Number (SIN), Your credit card or banking information

Recognize spoofing

Spoofing is used by fraudsters to mislead victims and convince them that they are communicating with legitimate people, companies, or organizations.

Caller ID spoofing: Fraudsters have the ability to manipulate the phone number appearing on call display either by call or text message. They can display legitimate phone numbers for law enforcement agencies, financial institutions, government agencies or service providers.

Email spoofing: Fraudsters can manipulate the sender's email address to make you believe that the email you're receiving is from a legitimate source. **Website spoofing:** Fraudsters will create fraudulent websites that look legitimate. In many cases, fraudsters will use a similar domain/website URL to the legitimate company or organization with a minor spelling difference.

Protect yourself from spoofing by

- Never assume phone numbers appearing on your call display are accurate
- Hang up and make an outgoing call when someone claims to be contacting you from your financial institution, service provider, law enforcement or government agency. Call the company or agency in question directly. Make sure you research their contact information and don't use the information provided in the first message or call.
- Verify any calls with your bank or credit card company by calling the phone number on the back of your bank or credit card.
- If you've received a call or other contact from a family member in trouble, talk to other family members to confirm the situation.
- Never click on links received via text message or email
- When visiting a website, always verify the URL and domain to make sure you are on the official website

AMIGO'S BLUE GUITAR

Walterdale Theatre is presenting Amigo's Blue Guitar by Canadian playwright Joan MacLeod, and directed by R-W member Bob Klakowich. It is a sensitive play about a family living off the BC coast that sponsors a refugee from El Salvador. Set in 1990, while a devastating civil war raged in that country, this award winning play explores what it means and feels like to relate to someone of a different culture who has endured intense personal grief. The story is told with warmth and humour, and invites us to consider how we ourselves would react. The Sunday matinee on February 11 at 2 pm will feature an audience talk back following the performance moderated by David Goa, a U of A professor and expert on immigration and new Canadians. Worship Notes

The building in which we worship and serve the world was first a Presbyterian church that came into union with The United Church of Canada in 1925. Back in 1912, plans were under way to build a new church for the growing Robertson congregation, with the purchase of the land upon which the building sits today. Construction was to begin in 1913, but all was not well in Edmonton. The real estate market was in a steep decline and money markets all over the world had collapsed, making the borrowing of money very difficult. The congregation had no choice but to look for a less grand building design and chose the First Baptist Church in Calgary as a model. The opening service was held on January 24, 1914 and people came each evening during that week. R-W was declared a Historic Heritage building in 1989. The 100-foot steeple of the church is a landmark and an important symbol of the community of faith. Combined with stylized wind representing the Spirit, it was incorporated into a new church logo in 2008.
