betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Creator had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord-and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.

Worship Notes

The Maundy Thursday Service teaches us about the last supper and the beginning of the ritual that we have come to know as Communion. In this ritual and act we remember and we are connected to Jesus and God through the Spirit found in the healing nature of the bread and wine. We proclaim in A Song of Faith that "In the communion meal, wine poured out and bread broken, we remember Jesus. We remember not only the promise but also the price that he paid for who he was, for what he did and said, and for the world's brokenness.
