

# Welcome to Robertson-Wesley

Please know that in the eyes of God you already belong here and you are welcome to participate in any of the activities of the congregation.

We acknowledge that the land on which we gather is Treaty 6 territory, a traditional meeting ground for Indigenous peoples. We acknowledge the Métis Nation of Alberta, Region 4, who are of mixed Indigenous & European heritage.

#### ACCESSIBILITY

There is an elevator located inside the building with the glass door entrance. Access ramps can be found: inside leading from the lobby to the sanctuary and outside at the rear of the building, leading from the parking lot.

There are accessible washrooms on each floor located near the elevator.

Large print worship bulletins, and hymn books are available from the ushers.

Service animals are welcome, except where food is prepared.

We commit to make R-W a comfortable space for people with cognitive impairment. If you require accommodations related to cognitive functioning please contact the office.

There is a sensory-friendly worship space in the Club Room every Sunday, where the service is live streamed into the room with reduced lighting and volume.

#### BABY/ CHILDREN'S AMENITIES

People can breastfeed anywhere in the building, should you want more privacy there is designated nursing space in the Millson room, located by the grand piano. Baby changing tables are installed in all washrooms. If you wish to use it, a children's activity centre is set up in the Chapel. There are also activity books available for children. Please ask an usher.

## Sacrament of Holy Communion

For those who worship online, prepare whatever is available in your house, a cracker, bread, muffin, and juice, wine, or water. People in the sanctuary will be offered bread and grape juice. There is a gluten free option available.

The celebration of communion is always a festival of friends, a pulling together of our lives and our hopes, our moments of agony and our glimpses of success. It is here, where bread is broken and wine is shared, that we can most fully be ourselves and see others for who they truly are: children of the living God.

Here the common things of life - bread and wine, memories and dreams - become holy, touched by God.

Here that which is earthly becomes divine, and that which is human becomes more than it has ever dreamed.<sup>4</sup>

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to God.

We offer joyful thanks to God.

Carrying a vision of creation healed and restored, we welcome all in the name of Christ. Invited to the table where none shall go hungry, we gather as Christ's guests and friends. #### Remembering Jesus at Table:

As we gather at this table, we remember that on the night before he died, Jesus had supper with his friends. He took a loaf of bread, thanked you as we have thanked you, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying: "Take, eat. This is my body, given for you. Each time you do this, remember me." Then Jesus took a cup, and after giving thanks, passed it to his friends, saying: "Drink. This cup is the promise of God, made in my blood. Each time you drink from this cup, remember me."

#### Life Passages

**Children & Youth: Children & Youth:** Children begin in the sanctuary, then go to Kids' Church. Youth meet in the youth room at the beginning of the service.

**Scripture:** Thessalonians 1:1-10 • The Thessalonians' Faith and Example. **Sermon:** What was that?

Today's scripture passage is one of the very earliest remaining pieces of writing to a community of followers of Jesus. As was his practice, the Apostle Paul has come into the important trade city of Thessalonica and begun talking about Jesus to whoever would listen. As often happened, the "insiders," those who might have been receptive to the scripture-fulfilling and tradition-transforming life, death and resurrection of Jesus are not moved and in fact are hostile to this message. In the meantime, outsiders find what is being taught so compelling that they form a community to learn more about Jesus and live in a way consistent with his message. We learn from Paul's writing that the community of faith in Thessalonica has already become an important sign of how Jesus' example and teaching is open to all those who would listen. When has a message that might have meant something important to you fallen flat? When have you been struck by a message that might have been intended for someone else?

#### **GREEN BITES**

Most people would agree that LED lights are preferable to incandescent lights. They are energy efficient, fewer LED lights are needed, and they have a much longer lifespan. But like most things, there are unintended consequences when they are used. First of all, disposal and recycling of LED lights is onerous, as their manufacture includes heavy metals and toxic chemicals that are difficult to remove. In the last few years, research re: the effect of LED lights demonstrates that with increasing light pollution (because LED lights are much brighter and whiter than their aged relatives the Incandescents), there is considerable reduction in the insect population. Most affected are the family Lepidoptera/moths, whose roles include pollination and provision of food for both vertebrates and invertebrates. In some parts of the world, current policy dictates that yard lights must be turned off during the night in order for valuable insects to reproduce in significant numbers rather than declining because of too much light. More food for thought, Indeed!
